

Scruffy – Slang for a person or animal that doesn't look well groomed. Especially when needing a shave. **Example:** When I wake up in the morning, I look pretty scruffy before I take a shower.

Five O'clock shadow – Slang for facial hair a man might have late in the afternoon. **Example:** My beard grows so fast, I have 5 O'clock shadow and have to shave before going out to dinner. Otherwise I look kinda scruffy!

Nose Blind – Slang for being so familiar with a certain odor, a person doesn't notice it. **Example:** Cat owners don't notice the cat box smell because they are nose blind, but guests always notice!

Morning breath – morning face – morning hair – Slang for a negative body condition when a person wakes up in the morning. **Example - 1.** I always have morning breath, but it's ok, because my husband is nose blind! **2.** When I have morning hair, I just wear a hat if I don't have time to wash it.

Slang for dry stuff in your eyes in the morning – **Sleep Sandman dust Eye boogers**

A good/bad turnout – Slang that refers to the amount of people at an event. **Example:** There was a very good turnout for the party!

The shoe is on the other foot – An idiom that means a person is experiencing the opposite of a situation. **Example:** I used to be a teacher. But now that I am back in school, the shoe is on the other foot! Similar to **In another person's shoes.**

Stumped – A slang word when a person doesn't know the answer to a question. **Example:** I was stumped by most of the questions on the test today.

Huddle Up – A slang term that tells a group to gather together to make a plan or discuss business. **Example:** Ok guys. Let's huddle up and re-think our design for the new machine.

I can read you like a book – A figure of speech that means a person knows another person's habits or usual thoughts and actions very well. **Example:** My husband is trying to keep a secret from me, but I can read him like a book!

Slang terms for having a lot of money – Loaded Filthy rich Dripping with money

It's a deal – A figure of speech that means you agree with an offer someone has made. **Example: Wife:** If you clean the house, I'll cook dinner. **Husband:** It's a deal!

If you want something done right, do it yourself – An idiom that means that if a person really wants to be satisfied with something, they have to do it themselves.

Butt in – A slang term for interrupting someone. **Example:** When the boss is talking to the team, don't butt in with your ideas.

Chime in – A slang term for giving your idea or suggestion. **Example:** If the boss asks, I'm going to chime in with my idea. Also: **give your 2 cents.**
